This workshop investigates the nature, transfer and development of the musical traditions of war, with a focus on the early modern and pre-modern periods. Histories of military music have tended to focus on the eighteenth century onwards, when European armies – under the influence of the Ottoman empire – began to expand their military bands, which then became the model for military and civilian bands the world over. While these developments are relatively well documented, the longer global history of martial and military music has not received the same attention. Drawing on a range of specific examples, the workshop thus hopes to make a significant contribution to the history and anthropology of the music of war. Lead questions include the following:

- What commonalities do the traditions discussed demonstrate?
- Are these commonalities evidence of cultural contact and transfer, of reference to common sources (e.g. sacred writings), or do they derive from practical or psychoacoustic qualities of the instruments used?
- What functions is music meant to fulfil in these traditions?
- How are martial and military musical traditions represented within the relevant cultures; how are they viewed by outsiders?
- What qualities, powers, symbolic value are attributed to the musical instruments used in martial contexts?
- What role have war, sieges, and colonial encounters played in the distribution of martial music traditions in the period in question?
